THE MYSTER OF THE EUCHARIST

We often use the term 'sacrament' – something beyond a sign, symbol, and making-present – to describe the Eucharist. The Eastern Tradition highlights it with the simple term 'mystery'. Growing up in a world post Agatha Christie novels, and with countless mystery movies and series, this term might not ring as its theological definition is inclined. Terming the sacraments 'mysteries' is not to say that they are beyond any understanding; it simply means that they have superabundant or are overflowing with meaning. The Eucharist is a wonderful example of this. Below are listed some different true descriptions or terms that can be applied to the mysterious Sacrament of the Eucharist. I invite you to reflect on which might resonate with you or speak into your experience of the divine.

- Holy Communion: This is a common term applied specifically to the community reception of the Eucharist. Even when one receives the Eucharist at home or in the hospital, it is in communion with the Eucharistic assembly (at which the sacrament was consecrated). This acknowledges that such an act unites the communicant with the wider community of faith through not only reception but true participation in the mystery.
- The Bread of Heaven: Since our forbears in the faith the people of Israel were fed with Mana in the desert, we have spoken of this 'bread from heaven'. We do not live only by our own means, but rely on the providence of God.
- **Bread of Life:** Sure, the bread is the 'work of human hands'; but it becomes, by a gift from beyond our own selves, the 'bread of life'. "Whoever eats this bread will live forever" (Jn 6:51). It is a promise and a preparation for the new life that Jesus promises to Nicodemus (Jn 4) and elsewhere (all through John)
- The Bread of the Presence: Jesus even refers to this (Matt 12:3–4; *c.f.* 1 Sam 21) in conversation with the pharisees. In temple Judaism, there were loaves of bread in the temble to mark the presence of God. These needed to be replaced often (as bread does), which itself is a sign of the living presence of God (rather than a statue, for example, which was also not a part of their tradition). The Eucharist is a sacrament of presence.
- Foretaste of the Heavely Banquet: Heaven is in many ways beyond our imagination. However, it is not beyond some poetic anticipation and expression. This understanding builds on the above as we look forward to fulfilling our created end in eternity life.
- Memorial of the Lord's Supper: Mass is a meal. This much cannot and should not be denied. However it is not *simply* a meal (as these other points help us to recognise). It will always stand as a memorial (a 'making-present') of the supper that Jesus shared with his Disciples before undertaking His passion and resurrection; a reminder of His love.
- The Word of God: Each Sacrament ('mystery') is a proclamation (a 'declaring and manifesting') of Jesus, our Saviour. Many confuse the verbal communication of the scripture readings for the extent of it. However, the 'Amen' that is and must be offered, the faithful acknowledge this Eucharist is a communication of the Truth.
- The Sacrificial Victim (Host): Much language concerning the Mass in recent centuries has focused on sacrificial terms (e.g. referring to the consecrated wafer of bread as 'hosts'). This recognises that the Jesus proclaimed is the one who offered Himself for our sins. Jesus is not sacrificed again and again, but we participate anew.

Louis Bouyer (*Liturgical Piety*, 1955) — a great liturgist and convert to Catholicism, who himself was a part of the working group that gave us the *Novus Ordo* of the missal (1970) — encourages us to not silo in any one of these mystical meanings. He encourages something of a pluralistic or combined approach. So, when you look at the list above, which resonate/s with you? And is there one that is truly at odds with how you have come to understand the mystery of the Eucharist? And, recognising this list was compiled from memory while 37,000 ft overs some ocean, are there any other terms or images that you feel could be used to express or grasp at the mystery of this sacrament?

Our two newest saints had great devotion to the Eucharist, while also living comparatively 'normal' lives in accessibly recent times.

Carlo Acutis (1991–2006) was an Italian teenager. He was known for his devotion to the Eucharist and his use of digital media with the faith. Born in London and raised in Milan, he had an early interest in computers and video games. Active in parish life, he served as a catechist and helped inspire several people to convert to Catholicism. He was diagnosed with acute promyelocytic leukaemia and died at the

age of fifteen. Acutis has been referred to as the "patron saint of the Internet", "God's Influencer" and the "first millennial saint."

Pier (Peter) Giorgio Frassati (1901–1925) was an Italian Catholic activist and a member of the Third Order of Saint Dominic. He was dedicat

the Third Order of Saint Dominic. He was dedicated to social justice issues and joined several charitable organizations, including Catholic Action and the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, to better aid the poor and less fortunate living in his hometown.

This weekend and next, young people in our parish will complete their journey of Christian initiation with participation in their First Holy Communion. They set out on a journey of discovery. They will be one

with us for the first time at this table of the Lord in any and all of the senses listed above. Let us pray for them and also for ourselves: that all may enter ever-more-deeply into the mystery that is the Sacaremtn of the Eucharist.
