### **ABORIGINAL & TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER SUNDAY**

This week is NAIDOC Week. NAIDOC originally stood for "National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee" which organised annual celebrations to recognise the history, culture and achievements of the Indigenous people of our country. The acronym is now used to refer to the celebrations and events known as NAIDOC week.

For Catholics, the week begins with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday and is organised by the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC). For this year's Sunday they have chosen the same theme as the NAIDO Week theme "We All Stand On Sacred Ground: Learn, Respect & Celebrate!"



The NATSICC Logo depicts a willy, willy, the wind force in the centre being a symbol of God's Spirit.

The round concentric circles at the top symbolises God and Life, the base depicts men and women receiving the Holy Spirit.

The logo was designed by Mrs. Olive Boddington from Western Australia.

Recently, the Bishops' Commission for Relations with Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders, on behalf of the Australia Catholic Bishops' Conference, released a Statement entitled "Solidarity: On The Road To Justice". ## The Bishops write:

A priest in a remote town gathers a number of Aboriginal women from the local parish and hands out holy cards with images of the Blessed Virgin Mary – Our Lady of Fatima, Our Lady of Guatemala, Our Lady Queen of Peace and others. He wants them to choose an image of the Blessed Virgin Mary that appeals to them. It is his intention to purchase a statue for the church according to their wishes. And what do they choose? Nothing less than an image of the Pieta, of



Mary seated with the broken body of her son cradled in her arms. And why that one? Because that is an image that they know firsthand, from experience.

of these causes have taken their toll among Aboriginal people in Australia, to a degree that might be described as horrific, scandalous, a most critical state of affairs and nothing less than a national shame.

For too many Aboriginal people, there is over them a pall of negativity, of failure and rejection. And those Aboriginal achievers who rise above the pervading feeling of low self esteem are themselves continually battling to stay positive, remaining as role models to their fellow countrymen, or working very hard at being supportive to those around them who struggle with addictions, poor health, and abject poverty. Certainly there are numerous examples of Aboriginal people in Australia who have learnt to live above the quagmire of defeat, but there are many, many others who live below a robust capability.

The Bishops in their Statement then proceed to reflect upon the Western Australian Government's move to close remote Aboriginal villages without appropriate consultation, which the Bishops describe as "negative change and repression" which was the experience of the indigenous people for over two hundred years after colonial settlement.

No matter the enormity of the challenge before us, we Australians need to be convinced of the worth of self-determination as a philosophy and methodology in need of immediate adoption. The present day neo-Assimilationist point of view offers no solution to the task of finding a way forward for Aboriginal Australia. Non-Aboriginal Christians must stand in solidarity with their Aboriginal brothers and sisters, while Aboriginal Christians are called to be determined, not to falter, no matter the obstacles that rise up to make a just way difficult. In faith and through prayer the energy needed to seek justice, to right what is wrong and to find a new, positive way forward is at hand.



## POPE FRANCIS ON INDIGENOUS PEOPLE

In his recently released Encyclical "Laudato Sí" ("Praised Be To You") Pope Francis speaks of indigenous peoples spiritual connection with the environment and that they hold one of the keys to a solution for the climate crisis. What Pope Francis writes is timely for us to reflect on on this Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday 2015.

"It is essential to show special care for indigenous communities and their cultural traditions. They are not merely one minority among others, but should be the principal dialogue partners, especially when large projects affecting their land are proposed. For them land is not a commodity but rather a gift from God and from their ancestors who rest there, a sacred space with which they need to interact if they are to maintain their identity and values. When they remain on their land, they themselves care for it best. In various parts of the world, pressure is being put on them to abandon their homelands to make room for agricultural and mining projects which are undertaken without regard for the degradation of nature and culture.

... Indigenous people "are able to instil a greater sense of responsibility, a strong sense of community, a readiness to protect others, a spirit of creativity, a deep love for the land. They are also concerned about what they will eventually leave to their children and grandchildren. These values are deeply rooted in indigenous peoples."
